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Seth Himelhoch, MD, MPH, is Associate Professor and Director of the Division of Consultation-Liaison Psychiatry in the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Maryland School of Medicine. He is Associate Residency Training Director for Research; a research investigator and faculty member in the Division of Psychiatry Services Research and a research investigator affiliated with the Veterans Affairs VISN 5 Mental Illness Research, Education and Clinical Center.

Dr. Himelhoch received his medical degree at the University of Michigan School of Medicine and completed his residency training in general psychiatry at the University of California, San Francisco. From 2001-2003 he was a Fellow in the Robert Wood Johnson Clinical Scholars Program at Johns Hopkins School of Medicine, where he concurrently received a Master Degree in Public Health from the Bloomberg School of Public Health. Dr. Himelhoch additionally completed a fellowship in Implementation and Dissemination Science through the Implementation Research Institute.

Dr. Himelhoch's clinical and research experiences have focused on access to care and treatment of co-occurring psychiatric and drug use disorders among individuals with HIV. He

has published over 50 peer-reviewed publications and has received external funding from NIDA, NIMH, SAMHSA and the Veterans Affairs.

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Kelly Wagner, B.S., is currently the Senior Technical Vice President for Training and Technical Support and Manager of MayaTech's Center for Technical Assistance, Training and Research Support (TARS). Mrs. Wagner has over 14 years of specific experience providing programmatic and evaluation technical assistance (TA) and training. Her areas of expertise include HIV/AIDS, substance abuse prevention and treatment, women's health, minority health, epidemiology, and health disparities. She has managed and implemented large, multi-site Federally-funded TA and training programs. Mrs. Wagner has served as the Project Director for Technical Assistance and Training for the SAMHSA Behavioral Health and HIV/AIDS Coordinated Technical Assistance Center (CTAC), the CSAT Evaluation of Pregnant and Post-Partum Women (PPW) project, and Deputy Project Director for CSAP's Substance Abuse and HIV Prevention Technical Assistance Coordinating Center (TACC). For the CSAT Division of Service Improvement TA project, she coordinated programmatic T/TA for the CSAT TCE/HIV and HIV Outreach grant program and its nearly 200 grantees, as well as provided support to CSAT's HIV Team GPOs. She previously served as the TA task leader for the CSAP Community Initiated Prevention Intervention Program Coordinating Center, where she managed evaluation TA provision, grantee meetings, and cross-site evaluation for 103 grantees. She has developed numerous data collection instruments and administration guides for Federally-funded grantees, conducted in-person and Web-based evaluation capacity building training, and conducted analyses of program-specific data collection tools for identification and development of cross-site data collection measures.

Mrs. Wagner holds a B.S. in Physiology and Neurobiology from the University of Maryland College Park and has a graduate certificate in epidemiology from The George Washington University School of Public Health and Health Services. She also was in the inaugural cohort of MayaTech's Executive Leadership Development Program and has successfully completed certified COTR, Advanced COTR, and Project Management Principles (PMP) training.
